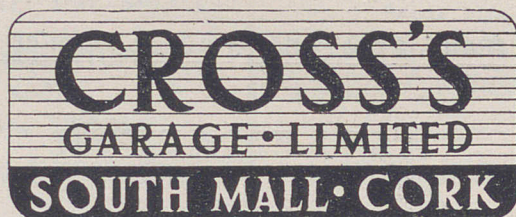

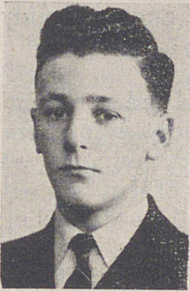

## *The Familiar Landscape*

The general scenery of the Midleton district is familiar to any one who has ever travelled along the great valley between Cork and Youghal. The valley is a long fold in the Old Red Sandstone which forms the plateau to the north and the narrow ridge to the south. Its floor is covered with thick limestone which exhibits some of the curious details which are peculiar to all limestone areas. Much of this is apparent and striking, but over the whole landscape, sandstone and limestone, are graven the effects of the last great ice age and the untidy fragments of its deposits.

The edge of the sandstone plateau is visible from the main road and recognised by the steep, but rounded edges, with many deep tributary valleys issuing from it. Ascend one of these ravines, say from Midleton to Lisgoold, noting as you go, the outcrops of bare red rock, with here and there patches of slaty red soil supporting open woodland, and presently you come out on the wide rolling plateau-top with broad barren moors flanking the road. Here much of the sandstone is covered with stiff reddish boulder-clay which retains the rain-water and gives rise to the moorland. In places, as at Birch Hill and Pigeon Hill, occur rounded hillocks of bedded sand and gravel, left behind by streams from the melting ice-sheet.

These same torrents brought down much fine sand and silt and when their speed was checked on reaching the flat limestone floor they spread their load in deltas or alluvial fans. The most perfectly shaped delta-fan lies north of the railway half a mile N.E. of Carrigtwohill; an excellent view of it is obtained from the summit of the limestone knoll at Rockville Farm. Three other extensive deltas occur further east, at the mouths of the Owenacurra glen and its tributaries, and can be seen from Carrigogna Bridge on the Fermoy road by the water-wheel of Cogan's Woollen Mill. The view is obstructed by tree-lined hedges and river-banks, but that is really all to the good as it is far more profitable to walk the area, field by field.

East of Carrigtwohill the road rises to pass through the saddle between two more limestone knolls (Minister's Hill). Spread out before one then is the flat land surrounding Midleton. One might expect that such evenness would be uninteresting, but nowhere does the partly buried limestone affect the topography more. Here and there, especially to the south of the road, the limestone stands up in reefs or crags often attaining a hundred feet above the level ground. Thick ice-sheets pushing eastwards roughened the western edge of the crag, but boulder clay collected on the east side, forming a "crag-and-tail" structure. A conspicuous roadside crag is that of Whitegate Rock ( $\frac{3}{4}$  mile W. of Midleton), now the site of a modern villa. The reefs occur in strong force south of the road, one mile east of Midleton. Nestling among them is a remarkable group of farm houses, or clachan, centred round a large pond. It is rare in this part of Ireland, and all the more unusual so close to a busy thoroughfare.

The flatness is due partly to a uniform cover of post-glacial gravel which hides the irregularities of the limestone. But the flatness is more apparent than real, for as in all calcareous districts there is much circulating underground water. At Water-Rock Level-crossing, a surface stream enters a limestone cavern, disappears under a ridge, only to reappear at its southern side a third of a mile away by the smithy at the first milestone west of the town. Past and present pupils will recall exploring the "Cave-field" example of underground drainage. Sometimes the roofs of such underground rivers fall in and result in circular depressions in the surface gravels, some dry, some water-filled. A row of these sink-holes occurs to the west of the Owenacurra. The first, a perfectly round lake, occurs in the ex-golf course on the outskirts of the town, a second near the railway  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile to North, and the third due west of the Avoncore Mills—a significant alignment.

Some of the flatness is due to a spread of alluvium laid in former times by the Dungourney river over the present College Sports Field, where it is over a foot thick, and stretching to the east beyond the ruined Cahermone Castle. This alluvium caused the river to assume a more southerly course, now canalised for the last mile to the distillery, and the scene of many College aquatic activities.

None of the features mentioned so far can be said to be awe-inspiring. Rather they possess the charm of miniatures without the aloofness of distant classic examples. Yet on first sight the meander scar in the late golf-course is at once dramatic and heart-lifting. Here is a vast semi-circular hollow, bounded by two cusps, cut into the gravel terrace and floored with damp alluvium. The sharpness of its features would almost lead one to think it as artificial as an ancient Greek amphitheatre. Immediately to the north the Owenacurra is incising another meander into the gravel, undercutting it, and exposing fine sections in cliffs 12 to 15 feet high. Rounded sandstone pebbles of various colours have been accumulated here from the sandstone series of the northern plateau. The river cuts a rock gorge at Bailick just as it enters the harbour at Ballinacurra. Then it takes a sharp bend to the west and cuts through the southern sandstone ridge in the transverse valley known as East Passage.

Interest here centres on the remnants of raised beach (East Ferry Church stands on a stretch of pre-glacial shore-line!) and on the picturesque woods of Rathcoursey and East Grove, grown on a slaty red soil.

The southern side of the great east-west valley, which has been barely mentioned, is notable for the mounds of washed gravel and sand which cover much of the land in the vicinity of the shore, from Little Island to Ballinacurra. Two of these mounds, opened for gravel, occur in Ballyannan Woods. Careful search in the gravel may reveal fragments of the "Middleton Red" marble, transported by the ice, perhaps from the limestone and marble beds,  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile to the west. The marble quarry is now idle for half a century.

Such is the physical landscape carved by the forces of nature, but over it all is the "human-scape", the network of field-fences, hedge-rows, roads, dwellings—single or in clusters, and it is for each individual to populate that landscape as he chooses.

## Thoughts on Leaving Ireland

## Music in 1952

There are several events of interest to record. On the 11th February we provided the music at the wedding in Midleton Church of Miss Helen Simpson to Mr. Thomas Morgan, M.A. On 28th May we visited the Cathedral Church of St. Colman, Cloyne, on the occasion of the Institution and Installation of our own Rector to the Deanery of the Cathedral. Our College Choir led the singing and Mr. McBride played the organ. On the same occasion Rev. Phineas Bury was instituted to the Incumbency of the Parish of Cloyne, and the solo in the Anthem "A Prayer of St. Richard of Chichester," (L. J. White) was sung by Robin Bury. The organ music included Gounod's "Meditation on Bach's First Prelude for Harpsichord" and Elgar's "Nimrod," ninth of the Enigma Variations.

On 23rd September in Midleton Church it was our melancholy privilege to sing music of a different kind. It was the funeral service of Mr. Daniel Humphreys, an Old Boy of the College and a valued member of our Governing Body for the last twelve years. His favourite hymn was sung, the 12th Century Easter Song, "The strife is o'er, the battle done" to Palestrina's music. The service concluded with "Nunc Dimittis," (Barnby). The coffin was borne into the Church, to the music of Handel's "I know that my Redeemer liveth," softly played on the organ, and the cortege left the Church to the strains of the "Dead March" from Handel's oratorio "Saul."

Wednesday afternoon, October 15th, found us again in St. Colman's, Cloyne, to lead the singing for the Annual Harvest Festival Service. This time the Anthem was Beethoven's "Creation's Hymn." A week later came the visit of the Hallé Orchestra from Manchester to Cork City Hall. Nineteen of our boys who are studying piano attended the afternoon concert conducted by Mr. Arthur Percival, sub-principal first violin. In his bright, breezy manner, Mr. Percival introduced the various items which included some pieces already well known to us all, "The Flight of the Bumble Bee," Mendelssohn's "Wedding March" and "Londonderry Air." A memorable occasion and a unique opportunity of hearing one of the finest orchestras of the world.

For the first time since 1939 we did not enter the Choir for the Examination of the Department of Education. Several of our best voices broke a few weeks before the examination was due to be held and we felt that the time at our disposal, (one hour per week) would be better spent in improving the Church music and learning some new anthems. In common with choirmasters both in this country and in Britain, we have noted the falling off in the quality of, and, in the number of treble voices available for choral work.

Seven boys entered for the Examinations of the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. All were successful and Cecil Gay passed with credit. At the Christmas Concert the following piano solos with organ accompaniment were played during the intervals:

- Air from Handel's Water Music (N. McMullen)
- The Pilgrims' Chorus from "Tannhäuser" (I. Johnston)
- This Is My Lovely Day from "Bless The Bride" (H. Redden)
- Melodie d'Amour (N. McMullen)
- The Robbers' Chorus from "Chu Chin Chow" (A. Jeffers).

J. Douglas opened the Concert with a selection from "The Barber of Seville." The Drummers during the year were D. Caldwell and J. McCluskey.

The Gramophone Concerts fill up the awkward hour between supper and bedtime on Sunday nights, as well as helping to stimulate an interest in music, both light and serious. We have recently obtained some new recordings by The Glasgow Orpheus Choir. Our best thanks are due to Mr. A. R. Day for the loan of recordings of "The Yeomen of the Guard" and "The Sorcerer."

# Rugby

A detailed statement of the exploits of our rugby teams in the past year would read almost like that of one of the touring teams of the Southern Continents, except that instead of following a circular route our lads made excursions from their base in East Cork to such distant centres as Waterford, Rockwell College, Co. Tipperary, and to Limerick, and in turn received visitors from these quarters, and also from many local schools. The simile holds too in regard to the number of matches played—the colossal total of nineteen. And the results? Well, a statistical summary appears at the end.

The year commenced badly, but ended well when we forced a draw with Waterpark College, Waterford, last year's winners of the Lawson Cup. The competition for this cup is entitled Bowen Shield "B" and five schools participate. This year for the first time the competition was conducted on a points basis rather than on the knock-out system, so that though beaten in the early matches we were able to persevere to the end and share in the final honours. The competition is in two sections, senior and junior. Waterpark won the senior, being undefeated, and Midleton won the junior also undefeated. Both Waterpark and Midleton lost two matches in the junior and senior respectively so that a tie resulted at the top of the table. Each holds the Cup for six months. Some Old Boys will recall that the College held the Cup continuously from 1941 to 1944.

With only half the members of the senior team remaining from last year much new talent had to be drafted in. Consequently for the first matches—all friendlies and all defeats—the team could only be regarded as in the embryonic or experimental stage. They soon settled down however. But though they achieved equanimity quite early in each game yet somehow they often failed to benefit from that advantage by pressing the attack home.

The senior team was decidedly stronger in the forwards this year, but this is not to belittle the backs. At full back D. Hosford was a most reliable tackler, had safe hands, but a rather short kick. On the right wing R. McHugh was very good; he is a powerful runner, and when in possession of the ball is irresistible. His weight is an advantage and he had six or seven scores to his credit at the end of the season. The other winger, B. Fullard, is likewise most promising. The centres R. O'Connell and D. Caldwell, both very swift, showed real football brains in the cuteness of their anticipation and the variety of their play. Mollard and Tomkins as out and scrum halves took severe trouncings with a patient shrug, and possessed of stamina and enthusiasm sought out their opportunities, and made the most of them.

The front row, Wilkinson (vice-captain), Deane (captain) and Locke were a hefty, experienced and indefatigable lot. In the tight they used their weight to great purpose, and often quite successfully manœuvred the scrum in the vicinity of the enemy line. McCook-Weir and de Foubert did trojan work in the arduous, thankless position of second row. J. Harris, an ardent player, D. Whitaker, also very keen, and W. Perrott were tough players and gave as good as they got. The place-kicking honours were divided between Mollard, Wilkinson and Deane. The substitutes who appeared occasionally were J. McCluskey, B. Moore, and K. Ruge-Price.

At the preliminary Munster Schools' Trial, the College was represented by W. McCook-Weir and J. Wilkinson but neither of them was chosen for the final trial.

The Junior Cup team shaped quite well and this augurs well for the coming year. It comprised the following:—Trevor West, E. Fleury, J. McCluskey, B. Fullard, R. Caldwell (highly promising out-half and expert at selling dummies) S. Tomkins (Captain and star-kicker of the side); G. Bateman, B. Moore, A. Jeffers, E. Dunne, K. Ruge-Price, J. West (keen as mustard), J. Ford, G. Boyle. The following obtained irregular berths on the team:—G. Northridge, J. Hornibrook, E. Wilson, de C. Hill, S. Kingston, and R. Boyle.

Some interesting juvenile matches for the "Under Eight Stone Team" were arranged with Presentation College Cork, and Glenstal Priory, Co. Limerick. This team included the smaller members of Junior Team and:—H. Redden, B. Creagh, A. Hill, R. Hayes, I. McElveen, T. Moore, W. Barrett and E. Williams. We wish them many more pleasant encounters in the future.

He was a loyal friend to those who were fortunate enough to gain his friendship. He will be missed not only in the College but in Middleton Church, which he loved and in which he worshipped on the day of his death.

**COLONEL JOHN B. BRADY, D.S.O.**

John Banks Brady was at the College in the early nineties of last century. He graduated in Trinity College, and went to South Africa during the Boer War, being awarded the Queen's Medal with four clasps. He also served in the 1914-1918 War and was in command of the Rhodesian platoon of the King's Royal Rifle Corps. He was awarded the D.S.O. and Croix de Guerre.

Successively teacher and inspector of schools, he became Headmaster of Milton School, Bulawayo in 1929. On his retirement, he entered politics and was M.P. for Bulawayo North, and later for Bulawayo East. During the last war he was Rhodesian liaison officer in Cairo.

During his university course he played Cricket for Dublin University and the Gentlemen of Ireland. His death at the age of 77 took place a few months ago in Bulawayo.

## Old Boys' Letters

H. R. CHANTLER, Geological Department, Trinidad Leaseholds, Ltd.,  
Pointe-a-Pierre, Trinidad, B. W. I.

I left home before Christmas in 1950 and boarded an oil tanker in Grange-mouth near Edinburgh. We sailed on Christmas Day, making our way round the north of Scotland, and thirteen days later arrived in Puerto-la-Cruz, in eastern Venezuela. There were eight others on the tanker and we had quite a good time, especially when we got near the Azores and the swimming pool was filled for us. We stayed one night in a hotel in Puerto-la-Cruz, (one night was quite enough) and flew on from there to Piarco—the airport of Trinidad. Here in Pointe-a-Pierre there is the largest refinery in the British Empire—turning out Regent gasoline—not sold in Ireland yet. I have three small oilfields to look after—Guayaguoyane, Mione Diablo, and Quinam—nice sounding names! I am very pleased about these fields, as they are scattered over the island and hence the Company gave me a car to run about in.

A note received to-day, asking for my photograph, reminds me of a good intention made years ago, to send a subscription to the Old Boys' Association. I am sorry for my negligence, and have pleasure now in sending you a cheque for £5.

My uncle, Robert D. Parker, was Headmaster, while I was at the College. I should think I was there about 1912 or 1913, and entered T.C.D. about 1920. I have a bad memory for dates—hence my being a bit vague.

I look back with great pleasure to my stay in Middleton, where I was elected Captain for four or five successive years.

I think the Magazine is remarkably well produced. It would be an improvement if the names of the Governors, Staff, and present office bearers were printed at the beginning.

H. M. ROBINSON, Lisle, Co. Cork.

This is my tenth and last trip on this 20,000 ton liner, "Empress of Canada." On the 27th of February, I joined the Marconi International Marine Co., Ltd. I signed on as Fourth Radio Officer. On the first trip we went to St. John, N.B. It is only a small town; the only item of interest is the "Reversible Falls," the water flowing into the sea on one side, and from the sea into the river on the other side, under a big bridge. I am told it is the only reversible falls in the world.

The last nine voyages we have been running to Montreal via Quebec city. Montreal is a fine city, and the suburbs are very well kept. I have seen most of the sights there, including the greatest building in what is left of the British

Empire, the Sun Life Building. One may get a beautiful view of the city from Mount Royal which overlooks it. On the summit of this mount is built a cross, which is lit up by electric bulbs at night, and may be seen for miles around.

I have been in Quebec city also quite a few times. It is very antique and quaint looking. The C. P. R. Hotel Chateau Frontenac sets off the rest of the city. The Montmorency Falls eighteen miles away are higher than Niagara.

The next ship I am on I will be the only radio officer on board, so all the responsibility will be mine. I am nearly certain to be with a different shipping company, as I am employed by Marconi, and they can put me on any ship on any line. I hope to go to Australia and New Zealand.

W. T. STICKLAND, 33, Rathfarnham Park, Terenure, Dublin.

I started in Middleton in September, 1928, there being only three boarders beside myself, Jack Mattsson, Cyril Wilkie and Roy Hardcastle, and we all slept in the big dorm. So far as I can remember there were only seven day boys at that time. When I left in 1934 all dormitories were full, and there were at least 70 pupils on the roll.

At present I am secretary of the Castleguard Textile Co., Ltd., Ardee, Co. Louth, and of Dundalk Linen Co. Ltd., Dundalk, Co. Louth. The latter is a subsidiary company of the former. The parent company has to do with the spinning and doubling of cotton, while the subsidiary does weaving and knitting of cotton underwear, embroidering and making up of handkerchiefs, and dyeing and proofing of heavy clothes and canvases.

Well, another year has passed and the sands of Arabia are still round about. I am perfectly acclimatised to Aden now, but, like most British and Irish people here, will be glad when my term of duty expires.

Aden is still in the world news headlines with the tanker "Rose Mary" collecting more and more barnacles as she lies motionless and apparently deserted at her moorings in the inner harbour.

I have had a number of interesting trips into South Arabia during the year. On one occasion I went by air to Beihan on the Yemen border, and with the help of the British Political Officer there, who acted as interpreter, (my Arabic is still confined to a few dozen words), I had the pleasure of conversing with the Sharif's brother, whose proudest possessions, were his rifle and ornamental dagger. His pro-British views are, I believe, representative of the rulers of the other states within the Aden Protectorate. Their several treaties with Britain, with an assurance of protection, have been responsible for the cessation of many tribal wars, and with the old sense of insecurity removed they can settle down to develop their territories.

You will be pleased to hear that I sat for my A.M.I.C.E. exam. out here last June, and that I am being elected an Associated Member in January.

# “Midleton College in the News.”

## A TRIBUTE FROM THE IRISH TIMES

“Nichevo” writing in the *Irish Times* of January 19th 1952, under the caption “Midleton College” says, “The school magazine, which apparently appears only once a year, is one of the best, if not, indeed, the best of its kind in Ireland. I am speaking now, of course, of the Protestant schools.

“Midleton has turned out some famous men in its time. Among the names of its old boys are those of John Philpot Curran and Isaac Butt. That is a pretty good start. Then we find several Fellows of T.C.D., including Provost Jellett, William and Michael Roberts, and Louis Claude Purser.

“Other well-known alumni included at least three bishops of the Church of Ireland—the Right Reverends Fitzgerald, Day (not the former Primate, but a former Bishop of Cashel) and Meade. Dr. Moore, a former headmaster, was the grandfather of Mr. Justice Kingsmill Moore, whose father, at one time, the distinguished head of the Church of Ireland Training College in Kildare Place, also was an old boy.

“And later days saw deeds as brave. I notice quite a number of distinguished names in the list of contemporary old boys in the magazine. Including that of Jack White, London Editor of the *Irish Times*, who was a classical Scholar and Moderator of Trinity, as well as president of the Phil., editor and chairman of “T.C.D.” and a big shot in the Trinity Players organisation. Midleton College has quite a lot to be proud of.”

The current number of the above journal has a twenty-seven page article on the history of Midleton College, by Michael Quane, member of the Society. Under the sub-titles, The Fountdress, The School Lands, The School, the author gives a detailed and most interesting account of the vicissitudes and fortunes of the school during its two hundred and sixty years, ending with the appointment of Mr. Albert Burd, B.A., as Headmaster in 1882.

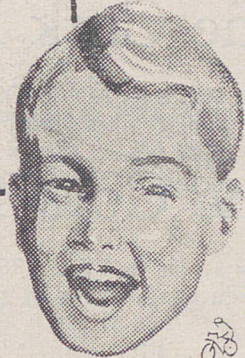
